Established in 1954, Who's Who Among Student Leaders in High Schools of America is a nation-wide, non-profit organization designed to give national honor and recognition to deserving high school students; to encourage them to develop their talents and continue their education.

Each student is awarded a certificate with the Gold Seal of recognition. The student's name and biography appears in the official publication for the current year. Letters of recommendation are written upon request of the student to any college or university for scholarship or entrance references. Letters are also written to prospective employers.

"EARLY CHOICE" ENLISTMENT PROGRAM

SFC FRANK C. CASPER, Twin Falls, Local Army Recruiter announces the Army's Special Enlistment Program for graduating High School Seniors.

1. To apply for the "Early Choice" option during the 60 days prior to your graduation from high school, you will need to obtain a letter from your high school principal or guidance counselor, stating that you are likely to graduate.

2. This letter will be taken to your local Army Recruiting Station. The recruiter will give you an initial qualification examination.

3. After passing this test, you will be interviewed by the recruiter. He

is an experienced counselor, well qualified to discuss your academic background and interests.

4. Based on your own abilities and interests, your recruiter will help you select a first-choice Graduate Specialist course and two alternates. If quotas for your first choice are filled, you may still become a Graduate Specialist in one of your chosen alternates.

5. The recruiter will then send you, at Government expense, to the Boise Recruiting Main Station, where you will receive your physical and mental examinations. After meeting the required standards a long distance call is then made to the Army Schools Section in Washington, D. C.

6. If an opening exists in the school of your choice, you will receive a written guarantee: a formal letter notifying you that a place in the course of your choice has been reserved for you. You do not actually enlist until you graduate from high school and shortly before your course begins.
